

### **Trustees' Report**

## Objectives

The Kindu Trust is a registered charity whose public benefit is to help needy children and young adults in Ethiopia.

The principal charitable purpose of the Charity is to relieve poverty, distress and suffering in particular, but not exclusively, by assisting with the provision of food, clothing, accommodation, health care and education for orphaned and abandoned children and other children and young adults who are in need of care and assistance.

### Sponsorship in the Community Project

#### Sponsorship Paid to Beneficiaries in Ethiopia

Under the Sponsorship in the Community Project, during this financial year, the guardians of sponsored children each received 180 Ethiopian birr per month and sponsored young adults in full-time education received 230 Birr monthly. Since the end of the year this amount has raised increased twice; by 20 Birr in June 2010 and by 30 Birr in December 2010. Amounts received are now 230 and 280 Birr respectively.

The sponsorship money is used by beneficiaries to pay towards rent, water, electricity, cooking fuel (charcoal, firewood, dried cow dung), food, clothes, shoes, educational materials (school uniforms, jotters, pens, etc), and medical treatment.

### Sponsorship Paid by Sponsors

The minimum sponsorship per month for new UK sponsors is £16, although many existing sponsors pay the previously requested amount of £13 and some pay more or supplement their sponsorship with money as gifts for the children.

Sponsors are encouraged to send gifts directly to Ethiopia and pay monies directly into the UK bank account, in order that we can reclaim Gift Aid, currently worth 25% of every pound donated.

The exchange rates have been more favourable this year, especially since the Ethiopian Birr was devalued in September 2009; the ensuing exchange rate has remained relatively stable at around 20 birr per £1 sterling

#### Feedback to Sponsors

After a few years of insufficient feedback to supporters we are pleased to say that the streamlined systems which were put in place in 2008 have meant that all sponsors now receive regular updates about their sponsored families.

In the summer of 2009, a new Kindu Trust website was launched, complete with a brand new logo, at www.kindutrust.org. The website enables sponsors to keep informed about Kindu activities and also provides a new mechanism of payment via PayPal, which has proved especially important for supporters living abroad.

A regular newsletter continues to be sent out, and The Kindu Trust is trying to transition supporters towards receiving their news by email, in order to cut costs.



# Trustees' Report, cont.

### **Number of Sponsored Cases**

The increased volume of information being sent out, coupled with a dedicated volunteer in the UK office has meant that many supporters who had ceased payment due to lack of information have since restarted payments. This has meant that the number of families that The Kindu Trust is able to provide direct financial support to has also increased.

In November 2009, The Kindu Trust launched its first ever Gift Catalogue. This contained gifts, such as school uniforms and books, that were designed to help provide some support to families who are not currently receiving sponsorship money. The Gift Catalogue raised £1,371 and received a lot of positive feedback from supporters.

### **Gondar Committee**

January 2010 saw a number of dramatic changes take place for the team in Gondar. Kate Fereday Eshete officially stepped down from her role as manager of The Kindu Trust. Because Kate is moving away from Gondar, to a small village in the mountains near Debark, she is no longer able to oversee the daily running of the charity. Instead she has accepted the position of "honorary President", and will continue to promote the charity in this capacity. In addition Marcy Aldecushion, a Peace Corps volunteer who had volunteered with The Kindu Trust for 2 years and was highly instrumental in improving supporter feedback, moved back to the USA in December 2009.

This has meant that from January 2010 the team in Gondar, headed up by Kassahun Demissie, have been responsible for the successful running of the projects in Ethiopia. Marta Bekele is now fully responsible for the finances of the Gondar office. The team has relocated to a much smaller office space, where they have re-focussed all of their efforts on improving the sponsorship programme. They are in almost daily contact with the UK office where Hannah Marcazzo, Volunteer Child Sponsorship Coordinator, provides instruction and guidance. In October 2009 Hannah visited Gondar for the first time to work with the team.

### Conclusion

In the absence of state benefits, there is a great need for financial aid for children and young adults in poor Ethiopian families; while the Government tackles the root causes of poverty your sponsorship continues to transform lives.

The Kindu Trust will continue its work to help the poorest children on Earth in line with international development targets to reduce the proportion of people living in extreme poverty and to cut maternal and infant mortality rates.

Partnerships and joint goals with other organisations operating in a similar area have also improved the overall benefits for the children of the region. In the UK, The Trust shares offices with Link Ethiopia and has a regular volunteer who has overseen the successful growth and development of the charity. The Board of Trustees have endeavoured to help in the turnaround of the Trust, moving it forward into the 21st Century. We are pleased to announce that all the efforts in the UK, which now requires a small increase in expenditure, and the hard working Gondar team now appear to indicate that this is happening.


